At 11.9 m. on State 28 is the loosely assembled village of NOKESVILLE. On a plain of grazing land distantly encircled by woods and fields, white and gray frame dwellings are scattered, with a square frame block of a building, formerly a Dunkard Academy, in the middle. The general air is neat and prosperous. Named for the family that once owned White Hall, the site of which is nearby, Nokesville is still the center of a Dunkard area. A few of the older folk continue to wear the distinctive costume.
