A large, two-story, red, brick building with a metal-covered roof, this building was built by Alexander Henderson. Henderson came to Virginia from Scotland in 1756. He was an officer under George Washington during the American Revolution, a large landowner, a merchant, and the father of Archibald Henderson, the fifth commandant of the U. S. Marine Corps, who held the position longer than any other person.

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The HENDERSON HOUSE, a large red brick dwelling (R) was built about 1785 by Colonel Alexander Henderson and more recently enlarged towards the highway. Above the tincovered hip roof are the molded tops of brick chimneys.

Alexander Henderson (1738-1815), who came from Scotland to Virginia about the year 1756, settled first in Colchester and was made a vestryman of Truro Parish, In the long dispute that took place in 1769 over the selection of a site for Pohick Church, when the vestrymen absented themselves from appointed meetings in order that there would be no quorum to take action, Washington wrote in his diary, "Went to an intended vestry at ye cross Roads – but disappointed of one by Mr. Henderson's refusing to act." Colonel Henderson, it seems, later repented of his indecision and cooperated with George Washington.
