I suppose she will endeavor for Fredericksburg or Alexandria, as she made an attempt to get off about 18 months ago, was taken up on the road to Alexandria, and said she intended for Philadelphia. She is very handy, spins well, and has been used to both house and plantation work.

SINAH, about 20 years of age, rather of a darker completion than Cate, has a sunken bumpy face, a very unbidding look, has a decay and holes in two of her upper foreteeth, a sulky ill natured countenance, well shaped, of the middle size, low forehead, and very bushy long hair; She took with her a pair of silk cuffs, some pieces of gauze, a white linen petticoat, a fine white shift, white linen enough for a shift and waistcoat, a black Virginia cloth petticoat, striped with white, a straw hat, covered and lined with black silk and trimmed with black gauze; had on a black striped Virginia cloth ditto, which she wore under the other. She has been brought up in the house, is a good seamstress, and spins well. Whoever will deliver them to me at my house, or secure them in any jail so that I get them again shall receive the above reward of fifty shillings for either, paid by Henry Lee

DICK (who sometimes calls himself Richard Mervile) a stout lofty Mulatto Fellow, of about 22 years of age, has large features and eyes, roguish down look, is artful and plausible and well acquainted in most parts of Virginia and Maryland, having formerly waited upon me. CLEM, a well set black Negro Lad, of about 19 years of age, has a

remarkable large scar of a burn, which covers the whole of one of his knees. It is impossible to describe their dress, as I am told they have stolen a variety of clothes since their elopement. They were carried to the Eastern Shore by a bay craft, where Dick was employed stowing of vessels, and Clem sawing of shinge butts. I suspect they are still on the Eastern Shore, or on board some bay craft. The above reward will be given to any person who will deliver them to me, in Fairfax County, on Potomack River, or secure them in any goal, and give me notice of it so that I get them again, or Five pounds for either of them.

Hewitt, stating that certain magistrates of the county of Prince William, to wit: -- CHARLES EWELL, JESSE EWELL, JOHN LINTON, THOMAS CHAPMAN, and JOHN FOX, sitting as a court on the 4th day of June term, 1818, "did corruptly command and cause their clerk to enter a verdict as the verdict of a jury, in the cause of CORNELIUS KENCHELOE vs JESSE SCOTT, not returned by the jury aforesaid, but one wholly different in words; and this they did after the jury had been discharged, and when the jury nor any one of them was in the court house, the magistrates aforesaid, sitting as aforesaid, did corruptly and oppressively refuse to enter up a judgment on the true verdict of the jury on the aforesaid case, "a rule is granted him against the said magistrates, requiring them to appear here on the first day of the next term to shew cause why an information or informations, should not be filed against them for the above cause.

The affidavit above referred to is in these words: "Personally appeared before me one the justices of the peace for the county of Prince William, THOMAS W. HEWITT and made oath, that on the fourth day of Prince William County court, held for June, in the year 1818, the court being composed of the following magistrates, to wit: CHARLES EWELL, JESSE EWELL, JOHN LINTON, THOMAS CHAPMAN, and JOHN FOX, they, the aforesaid magistrates siting as a court for the administration of justice, did corruptly command and cause their clerk to enter a verdict (as a verdict of the jury in the cause of CORNELIUS KENCHELOE vs JESSE SCOTT) not returned by the jury in the cause aforesaid, but one wholly different in words; and this they did after the jury had been discharged, and when the jury nor any one of them was in court. That the magistrates aforesaid, sitting as aforesaid, did corruptly and oppressively refuse to enter up judgment on the true verdict of the jury in the aforesaid case. Given under my hand the 20th day of October, 1818

THE COMMONWEALTH, against CHARLES EWELL, JESSE EWELL, JOHN LINTON, THOMAS CHAPMAN, and JOHN FOX, justices of Prince William County, DEFENDANTS. On a rule of this court entered against the defendants at the last term to shew cause, &c. This day came as well the attorney for the commonwealth as the defendants by counsel, and the court having fully heard the evidence and arguments of counsel, and having maturely deliberated thereon; it is ordered that the rule be discharged, and on motion of the defendants, by their counsel, it ordered that the written opinion of the judge, delivered on the decision of this cause, this day by him and to the clerk, be filed with the papers. The written opinion of the judge above alluded to, and filed is in the following words.

THE COMMONWEALTH vs THE JUSTICES OF PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTY. On a motion to discharge a rule to shew cause why information should not be filed against them for corruption and oppression in office.

This is a motion, on the part of the defendants, to discharge a rule to show cause why information should not be filed against them for corruption and oppression in the exercise of their judicial functions. The subject is of great importance, and has received that full and deliberate investigation to which it was entitled from its magnitude. With all the attention which this court could bestow upon the enquiry, it has been found difficult to ascertain the real state of several of the facts. The testimony has often been confused, doubtful and contradictory: nor is it remarkable it should have been so, when it is recollected that one portion of the witnesses was under the influence of considerable excitement, whilst the others were wholly indifferent and careless of the proceeding. The following is the most accurate analysis which the court could form: The jury in the case of the county court, from whence this controversy has originated, after their retirement, returned into the court, and offered to the court, through its proper organ, what, for distinction sake, may be called the first verdict (for the sum of \$1220). This verdict was reported to the court by the clerk, and at the moment of his closing his report, a motion was made to the court, by the defendant's counsel, for a non-suit, whilst precisely at the same time, with the consent of the jury, the olaintiff's attorney was modifying their verdict. The first verdict having been obviously corrected by interlineation, it is not clear whether that, as corrected, or the second verdict wholly in the hand writing of the plaintiff's attorney, was read to the whole of them before their discharge; it is, however, certain, that as speedily as the correction could be made, the amended verdict was read by the counsel to the jury, and assented to by them, and that this verdict was substantially, if not in terms, the same with that written by the plaintiff's counsel. It would seem that but little time had been occupied in these proceedings at this stage of them, that the jury was discharged and dispersed.

David has a wife belonging to Mr. John Singer, who some years since moved from Culpeper county to Harrison County, Va. and for the last two years has been in habits of intimacy with a Negro woman by the name of Rosel who was sold last fall by Mrs. Berryman, of King George County to Mr. George Mason, of Gunston, Fairfax Co. Va. It is probable he will attempt to get to one of these neighborhoods.

Jack is a lively black fellow, about thirty years of age, of the middle size, a little bow legged, rather an awkward hand in the field, having been bred a house servant, at which he excels, rather a surly disposition, and by profession a Baptist. He has a father belonging to Mr. John B. S. Fitzhugh, near Falmouth, Stafford County Va. and a wife and family belonging to Mr. Thomas Fitzhugh, of Brenton, Prince William County. It is highly probable he is lurking in one of these neighborhoods; had on when he absconded, an old hat, a suit of domestic cloth cotton and yarn, and a brown linen shirt, and carried with him a suit of white domestic jeans. It is probable he and David will change their names and dress. FIFTY DOLLARS will be given for apprehending and securing in jail said Negroes, or half for either, if taken in the state of Virginia, or District of Columbia; or the above reward, if taken out of the state, & all reasonable charges, if brought home to the subscriber's residence. Masters of vessels, and others, are forewarned from harboring or carrying off said Negroes.

On their way up they met the Captain who told Athey that he was named Noble Haycum and that half of the vessel belonged to him. In Washington she was deserted by the Negro, who stated that he intended to go on board the Pleasant of Alexandria. The Negro was called Phil.

Harcum told him also, that Captain Owens of Wecomico in Northumberland, Va owned one half the vessel. After returning with and landing Bill Dye at Wade's Bay, for whom they had carried the wood to Washington, they run up to Quantico. The captain told

Athey that he was going on shore to kill some ducks. He left the vessel, taking only his gun, and put the papers of the vessel in his pocket. He fastened the canoe in which he landed to a fence extending in the water, not far from the vessel, and has not been since heard of here. "Onher stern is painted "Susan & Jane of Yeocomico," Athey is now in Dumfries and the vessel is in the care of a Ship Master. She is a schooner of about twenty-five tons Burt hen. On board there are a few articles of provisions, &c. The owners are requested to come forward, produce her papers, pay charges and take her away; otherwise she will be disposed of as the law directs.

Triform Community in Prince William

On Michaelmas day, September 29th, the Triform Agricultural Community in Prince William County, Va., held their first Tripartition day. The Parrish chest contained, it was presumed, \$100 more than would be required to meet all outstanding debts and carry on all agricultural operations. The plus or the more than enough, was fixed, however, at \$99.54; and that sum was forthwith divided and subdivided as below. Several neighbors have evinced a desire to understand the modus operandi of the triform system, and they may now easily comprehend the dollars and cents features of the subject, by attending to the division and subdivision of this first small sum: The plus to be triparted was \$99.54. The first third, \$33.18, was carried the Rent Fund, to create dividends upon landlords' shares. The second third, \$33.18, was carried to the Interest Fund, to create dividends upon capitalists shares. The third third, \$33.18, was carried to the Profit Fund, and was forthwith subdivided according to age among the cooperatives, for pocket money, as below, the profit to be subdivided being \$33.18, and the united ages of all the co-operatives being 237 years, the fraction for one year, called the zetation, was 14 cents.

Last year there was no tripartition, the disbursement exceeded the receipts by about fourteen hundred dollars. This year the profit affords only a miserable pittance after two years toil; it may, however, be expected to improve forever. It should be remembered, also, that before a plus for tripartition can be struck off from the general proceeds every member of the community must be provided with all things in anyway needful, and all farming expenses must be incurred, out of these proceeds. If a member were to put his zetations into the fire, or if he were to buy peg tops, paper kites and other gewgaws and jimcracks with his money, he would actually fare none the worse for his folly; but he would be more discreet, especially when the plus to be triparted shall become a thousand instead of a hundred dollars, if he were to invest his zeiations in landlord's shares or capitalist shares in his own community, and thus entitle him to dividends or Rent or Interest. By such means the whole property, step by step would become vested in the co-operatives. English agricultural laborers have generally no capital nor

any property that would be accepted as good security for the loan of money; but they may, nevertheless, under the triform system of co-operation, place themselves in the position of individuals having abundant funds, and without laying themselves under humiliating obligations to any body.

The triform agricultural community, by an act of incorporation, may become the triform agricultural company; and then landlords' shares and capitalists shares to any amount for which the rent fund and interest fund will afford average dividends of five per centum per annum, may be issued; and each share sold whole, for whatever sum it will bring, in the money markets of London, Paris, and Europe generally. The proceeds of shares thus sold, would replenish the original or establishing fund for buying land, stock, implements, and etc. to form additional establishments. This measure would also verify international justice: European nations, which now disgorge their excess of half-starved laborers upon the shores of America, would then supply funds to enable these American immigrants to become prosperous settlers.

If a few wealthy, patriotic and Christian citizens would endeavor to comprehend all the characteristics of the triform system of agricultural co-operation, an unite in an effort to establish that system in its full integrity, they might advance American supremacy more efficiently, than all the railroads within the union, and all the gold of California, can ever accomplish. When requested to direct his optics to this subject, for the benefit of his colonial posessions, John Bull was blind; and probably his giant son, Jonathan, will see no better. The little experiment now in progress in Virginia, being but the effort of an individual of only moderate pecuniary resources and of limited personal influence can scarcely be expected to demonstrate all the capabilities of the triform system; but it may, nevertheless it is hoped, prove sufficient ultimatly, to open the eyes of the blind in both countries.
